Lesson: 20_1 - Job Introduction

For whatever things were written before were written for our learning, that we through the patience and comfort of the Scriptures might have hope.

(Romans 15:4)

The Book

- Perhaps the earliest book of the Bible.
- The book tells the story of a man, Job, who lost everything his
 wealth, his family, his health and wrestles with the question of
 why.
- The events of Job happened in the **patriarch period** during the time of Abraham, Isaac, Jacob and Joseph. Most likely a contemporary of Isaac and Jacob.
 - Job lived **before** the average age of man was shortened to 70-80 years. He lived 140 years after his suffering. (Job 42:16)
 - He lived before sacrifices were confined to one altar as in Moses' time.
 - He lived during the time when God was known by the name
 " Shadday {shad-dah'-ee} "Almighty" and not " Yehovah {yeh-ho-vaw'} "Yahweh". "Shadday or Shaddai" is used more than 30 times in the book by Job and his friends.
 - Yehovah is used in the heavenly courts and at the end of the book.
 - He lived during the time when divine knowledge was passed on by tradition, not by writing. MEDITATE ON THIS!
- This being true we must remember that Job's knowledge of God was much less than Moses, the Old Testament prophets, John the Baptist, the Apostles, and us!
- Job did not have the benefit of knowing what was going on in heaven while he lived – WE DO!!

- We need to remind ourselves of the words of Christ, "For unto whomever much is given, of him shall be much required." Luke 12:48
- **REMEMBER** what Christ said of the cities in which He did great works read Matthew 11:20-24.
- The Book of Job was written "for our learning" (Romans 15:4) WOE unto us if we do not learn.
- The book begins (chapters 1-2) in heaven with a debate between God and Satan.
- Chapters 3 to 37 outline three debates that Job has with his friends.
- Chapters 38-42 deal with GOD's answer to Job's suffering.
- "Job" is referred to in Ezekiel 14:14, 20 along with Noah and Daniel. His patience is mentioned in James 5:11. Eliphaz is quoted in 1 Corinthians 3:19; Job 5:13)

Christ in Job

- Job acknowledges a REDEEMER (see Job 19:25-27) Christ is THE REDEEMER (Luke 1:68; Galatians 3:13; Titus 2:14; 1 Peter 1:18-19; Revelation 5:9, 14:3-4)
- He cries out for a MEDIATOR (Job 9:33 Christ is THE ONLY MEDIATOR (1 Timothy 2:5; Hebrews 8:6; 9:15; 12:24; 1 John 2:1)
- "Job" is a picture of our suffering Christ.
 - Job suffered at the **will of God** while **"innocent"** so that **we** might learn more about God.
 - Christ suffered at the **will of God** while **"innocent"** for us. (1 Peter 3:18)
 - Job endured his suffering and was rewarded at the end of them, as Christ **endured the Cross** (Hebrews 12:2) for us.

Job, the Man (Job 1:1-5)

- "the land of Uz" is probably in or near the land of Edom see Lamentations 4:21.
- HIS MANHOOD: "There was a man . . . "
 - Job was a REAL man.
 - Job was subject to like passion as we are.

- HIS CHARACTER: "blameless(or perfect) (☐☐☐ tam {tawm} meaning "complete"; "whole"; "morally innocent"; "having integrity and upright"
 - "who feared God" -
 - "The fear of the LORD is the beginning of knowledge" Proverbs 1:7
 - "The fear of the LORD is the beginning of wisdom" Prov. 9:10: Job 28:28.
 - "The fear of the LORD is to depart from evil." Proverbs 3:7; 16:6
 - "The fear of the LORD is to hate evil." Proverbs 8:13
 - ➤ Consider carefully Romans 11:13-22.
 - "who shunned (turned away from; departed from) evil"
 - NT saints are commanded "to abstain from the appearance of evil" – 1 Thessalonians 5:22.
- **HIS FAMILY:** "seven sons and three daughters" plus a wife. A family of **12.**
 - It appears that this was close family since the met regularly to celebrate together. (vv. 2, 4)
 - It obvious that this family enjoyed life and enjoyed it together.
- HIS WEALTH: "7000 sheep + 3000 camels + 500 yoke of oxen"
 - Job acknowledge that it was God who made him rich! (Job 1:21)
 - The riches of this world belong to God and He gives them to whomever He wishes. (1 Chronicles 29:11; Psalm 24:1; 1 Samuel 2:7; Deuteronomy 8:17-18; Job 1:10, 21; Ecclesiastes 5:19; Psalm 75:7)
 - Job used his wealth generously for the good of others. (4:1-4; 29:12-17; 31:16-32)
 - Job was obedient to the will of God as expressed by Paul to Timothy concerning rich people in 1 Timothy 6:17-19.
- HIS REPUTATION: "the greatest of all the people of the East"
 - ✓ Job was approved by GOD (vv. 1, 8) and . . .
 - ✓ Approved by **men** (v. 3)
- HIS RELIGION: Job regularly "interceded God" on behalf of his children (v. 5).
 - Job was <u>serious</u> about his religion and his (as well as his family's) relationship with the Almighty God.
 - Job acted as the **priest** of the family. He represented his family to God.

 For Job there was a time and place for everything. There was time for feasting and partying **but** then he would call his family to their spiritual duties.

Job in the New Testament (James 5:10-11)

- (v. 10) Remember the PROPHETS who spoke in the name of the Lord, as an examplesuffering and patience (fortitude).
 - ➤ (2 Corinthians 12:7-10) IMITATE PAUL 1 Corinthians 11:1
- (v. 11) "Blessed are those who endure" Matthew 10:22; Hebrews 10:36-39; 6:10-12.
- (v. 11) "perseverance" **ENDURANCE**: $\dot{\nu}\pi o\mu o\nu \dot{\eta}$ hupomone {hoopom-on-ay'} steadfastness, constancy, endurance, perseverance, a patient enduring, cheerful endurance!
- In the New Testament this is a characteristic of a man/woman who is not swerved from his/her deliberate purpose and his loyalty to faith and piety by even the greatest trials and sufferings!
- (v. 11) "that the Lord is very compassionate and merciful."
- (Job 13:15) "Though He slay me, I will hope in Him."

Lessons to Be Learned from Job

- GOD IS SOVEREIGN OVER GOOD AND EVIL! (Isaiah 45:7; Proverb 16:4; Lamentations 3:37-38; Amos 3:6; Romans 11:36; Colossians 1:15-17; Hebrews 2:10; Revelation 4:11; Acts 2:23; 4:27-28; Luke 22:22; Jeremiah 18:11; Micah 2:3)
- GOD IS HOLY, PERFECT, and JUST in ALL that He does. (Deut 32:3-4)
- GOD IS SOVEREIGN OVER OUR LIVES. (1 Corinthians 6:19-20)
- Satan is a servant of the Lord. (Next Lesson)
- God is sovereign over suffering.
- God uses suffering to accomplish His eternal plan.
- There is NO LAW above the KING. The Lord answers to NO ONE! (Job 33:13; Daniel 4:35; Psalm 115:3; 135:6)
- We need to "see" God, El Shaddai, as He has revealed Himself. If we get a glimpse of Him we will "abhor ourselves, and repent in dust and ashes" (Job 42:5-6)
- We need to stand in AWE of GOD. (Psalm 33:8; 99:1; 2:11-12; Philippians 2:12)
